

The world has changed, and so has Girl Scouts.




leadership, academics, career aspirations, and hope for the future:

- Better civic engagement




Leadership

How?

Three Processes:

Girl-Led

Nowhere else in the world is a girl given the power to craft her own experience from the get-go, even at the youngest of ages. This is the power of Girl Scouting. We believe that when you give a girl the chance to lead, she will step up to the challenge in a big and bold way—more than you might think possible.

Learn By Doing

Girls jump right in and learn while they try something out for the first time. Then, girls apply what they learn to other areas of their lives.

Cooperative Learning

Girls work alongside each other as they learn throughout their Girl Scout experience. This leads to lifelong, meaningful friendships, and builds critical communication skills.

If there is an activity that you and your troop want to do, there is probably a badge for it!


Girls document everything that they learn in Girl Scouts by earning badges.

Financial literacy is a critical milestone any successful leader needs to develop. Through the Girl Scouts Heart of Michigan Product Program, she will develop five critical entrepreneurial skills.

Girls who participate in Girl Scouts Heart of Michigan's **Product Program** learn 5 skills.



GOAL SETTING

Girl Scouts set Product Program goals individually and, with a team, create a plan to reach them. They develop cooperation and team building skills along the way.



DECISION MAKING

Girls help decide how the team will spend their Product Program proceeds, furthering critical thinking and problem solving skills that will help in many aspects of life.



MONEY MANAGEMENT

Girls take Product Program orders, handle customers' money, and gain valuable and practical life skills around financial literacy.



PEOPLE SKILLS

Girls learn to talk to. listen to, and work with all kinds of people in the program. These experiences help them develop healthy relationship and conflict resolution skills they can use throughout their lives.



BUSINESS ETHICS

Girls are honest and responsible at every step of the Cookie Program. Their business ethics reinforce the positive values they are developing as Girl Scouts.

The Girl Scout Highest Awards








The Girl Scout Highest Awards are earned by working with a team to build a sustainable solution to a problem identified in their community. The Highest Awards focus on learning leadership skills and helping their community. By earning one of these awards, girls help make the world a better place! The Highest Awards are the Bronze Award, the Silver Award, and the Gold Award.

Gold Award Girl Scouts:

Discover Girl Scouts

- Are eligible for 40+ different college scholarships.
- Feel they have had success in life (95% vs. 82%).
- Think of themselves as a leader (81% vs. 50%).
- Have more leadership experience in volunteer activities, school, the community, and politics.
- Are entitled to enlist at a higher pay grade if they join the military.







Of Girl Scout Alumnae...

Leadership 84%

feel they have had success in leadership, compared to 64% of non-alumnae.

Sense of Self

70%

strongly feel they lead a purposeful and meaningful life, compared with 42% of non-alumnae.

Life Success **95%**

feel they have had success in life, compared with 82% of non-alumnae.

Life Satisfaction 98%

are happy with their life, compared with 87% of non-alumnae.

Community Service **70%**

are very active in volunteer work/community service, compared with 41% of non-alumnae.

Leadership

81%

think of themselves as a leader, compared with 50% of non-alumnae.

Civic **Engagement**

58%

have been involved in **politics**, compared with 40% of non-alumnae.

Why Volunteer?




Volunteering provides a wide variety of surprising health benefits
